HISTORY OF FORT EISENHOWER



- Camp Gordon held its groundbreaking ceremony on 18 October 1941.
- During WWII, the 56,000-acre training site was home to three divisions: the 4th Infantry Division, the 26th Infantry Division, and the 10th Armored Division and served as a Prisoner of War camp.
- On 1 October 1948 the Signal Corps Training Center (SCTC) was activated, it would become the primary producer of Army communications specialists.
- On 21 March 1956 Camp Gordon was redesignated as Fort Gordon.
- Following Vietnam was a period of reorganization which resulted in the consolidation of all signal training at the newly established US Army Signal Center on Fort Gordon.
- In June 1986 the US Army Signal Corp Regiment was established and Fort Gordon was designated the regimental home base.
- During Operations Desert Shield/Desert Storm in the 1990s, the Signal Center prepared soldiers for deployment and became the training grounds for all satellite operators and maintainers within DOD.
- In 2013 Army leadership directed that ARCYBER relocate to Fort Gordon to consolidate and streamline Army cyberspace and affiliated functions.
- In March 2014, the Signal Center of Excellence transitions to the United States Army Cyber Center of Excellence.
- Still the "Home of the Signal Regiment," the newly named Fort Eisenhower is a power projection platform for the Army. Hosting all services of the Armed Forces, it is the nation's premier center for training and operations of the complex communications that empower our military.













GENERAL DWIGHT D. EISENHOWER

BIOGRAPHY



- October 14, 1890: David Dwight Eisenhower was born in Denison, Texas, third of seven sons of David Jacob and Ida Elizabeth Stover Eisenhower. At the age of two, his family returned to Abilene, Kansas.
- June 14, 1911: Entered United States Military Academy, West Point, New York. Graduating and commissioning as a Second Lieutenant in 1915.
- September 1915-February 1918: Served with the Infantry in Ft. Sam Houston, Camp Wilson and Leon Springs, Texas and Ft. Oglethorpe, Georgia.
- August 19, 1925: Entered Command and General Staff School, Ft. Leavenworth, Kansas; graduated first in a class of 245, June 18, 1926.
- November 29, 1929-February 1933: Served as executive officer to General George V. Moseley, Assistant Secretary of War, Washington, DC.
- 1933-September 1935: Served as chief military aide to General Douglas MacArthur, Army Chief of Staff.
- December 1941-June 1942: Named Deputy Chief in charge of Pacific Defenses under Chief of War Plans Division, General Leonard Gerow, December 1941.
- February 1942: Designated as Chief of War Plans Division.
- November 1942: Named Commander-in-Chief, Allied Forces, North Africa.
- December 1943: Appointed Supreme Commander, Allied Expeditionary Forces, commanding forces during the Normandy Invasion in June of 1944.
- December 20, 1944: Promoted to General of the Army (5 stars).
- November 19, 1945: Designated as Chief of Staff, U.S. Army.
- May 31, 1952: Retired from active service and resigned his commission.
- January 20, 1953-January 20, 1961: Served two terms as President of the United States.
- March 28, 1969: Died at Walter Reed Army Hospital in Washington, DC. Buried in the Place of Meditation, Abilene, Kansas.
